Winter Aid/Emergency Relief

In addition to the exciting new programs and initiatives we began this year, we also continued our long-standing mission of distributing essentials necessary to survival throughout the year. Afghanistan has very harsh winters, with parts of it averaging -15° C/5°F in January, and many Afghans suffer from cold and exposure each year. Each year the Bayat Foundation works to save lives by distributing blankets, coats, hats, and food to some of the most vulnerable Afghans.

In 2012 we distributed aid in areas including Nangarhar Province, Jowzjan Province, Maidan Warkdak Province, Panjshir Province, Sar-e-Pol Province, and areas of Kabul including Karte Naw, Shahr Kohna, and Lissa Ariana.



Child & Maternal Health

According to the UNDP, child mortality rates in Afghanistan are among the highest in the world, with 1 in every 4 children expected to die before the age of 5.

Child and maternal health has always been an important part of the Bayat Foundation's mission, and in 2013, we will bring it to the forefront. We will revisit the ten hospitals we have already built throughout Afghanistan to ask hospital administrators what equipment and supplies would have the greatest impact on saving mothers and children, and will respond accordingly. Along with other like-minded organizations, we will strive to make a real difference in the current mortality statistics.



In the year to come,

- We will fund a computer lab for the Tahya-e-Maskan Orphanage
- We will build an ICU/CCU wing for Afghanistan's top children's hospital, Indira Gandhi Hospital in Kabul
- We will refurbish a wing of the Rabia Balkhi Hospital's Maternal Healthcare Unit
- We will continue to distribute school supplies, food products, warm clothes and blankets to Afahans in need.
- We will work with other non-profits in the U.S. to ship their donations of food and school supplies to children in Afghanistan.









We are thrilled to announce that Afghan Solar will be donating and installing \$30,000 worth of solar power equipment for the Bayat Foundation. We will use this donation at select Bayat Foundation hospitals in Afghanistan to power the equipment used to save patients' lives. The equipment donated by Afghan Solar will ensure that our hospitals have a reliable and consistent source of power, will reduce operating costs, and will help Afghanistan's environment by reducing our carbon footprint.

Beautify Afghanistan

Afghanistan's bounty of nature has become scarred by overuse, pollution, and neglect. Many Afghans today struggle to find adequate sources of potable water and polluted water has become a major factor in the spread of diseases such as diphtheria, cholera and malaria. To help combat this, we are pleased to announce a new strategic initiative for 2013 and beyond – Beautify Afghanistan: Education. Empowerment. Environment. This initiative will hire Afghans to assist in waste cleanup, reforestation, and general beautification. We are confident that this program will help Afghans to engage with their natural environment in more productive and sustainable ways than at present, helping to ensure a lasting legacy of natural beauty and resource for future generations
